Cold Weather Tips: Home and Garden

With the coldest months of the year upon us, it's important to be prepared for any rough weather that comes our way. Plan ahead and stay safe.

- ü Keep flashlights handy and make sure they have fresh batteries.
- ü Note the 24-hour customer service lines for utilities, in case you have a power outage or suspect a natural gas leak (Puget Sound Energy's is 1-888-225-5773.)
- ü Build an emergency kit that includes at least a three-day supply of food, water, medicine, and pet supplies, a first-aid kit, more flashlights and batteries, and a battery -powered radio.
- ü Check your furnace filter monthly and clean or replace as needed.
- Keep your home at the lowest comfortable temperature. (For most homes, the heating bill

drops by about 2 percent for every degree the thermostat is lowered.)

- Keep shades and curtains open during the day so the sun can make your home warmer.
 Close them in the evening to keep the heat in.
- ü Use generators correctly - never inside your home or garage. Also, do not hook up a generator directly to your home's wiring.
- iii If using space heaters, be very careful.
 Place on a level, hard, nonflammable surface, and away from curtains and clothing. Never leave unattended.
- ü Never burn charcoal indoors, and do not use a stove or oven to try to heat your home.
- ü Also, be very careful with lit candles; as a light source, flashlights are much safer.
- ü Open cabinet doors under sinks, espe-

cially where plumbing is in outdoor walls, to let interior heat warm the pipes. Let the cold water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes.

- Keep your outdoor meters clear of snow and ice buildup. Use a broom to gently clear snow away from the meter and the area around it, and never shovel show against the meter or pipes.
- Don't forget to have a supply of rock salt or sand on hand for traction on ice.
- ü There's still some time to complete fall garden clean up to prepare for spring: remove frost-bitten annuals; cut back the vellow leaves of hosta, daylilies, and lilies; dig and divide the spring-blooming perennials; move tender plants indoors or under cover; and pull the deep-rooted weeds like thistle, dandelions, and plantain now so they don't get established over the winter.
