

Welcome to all our neighbors, new, established and those who are entertaining a move to Sunset Cove!



Treasurer Update

- Total assets on hand as of January 1st, 2023 are \$55,595. Working balance \$16,615, unallocated reserve balance \$31,838, WA Blvd median project reserve balance \$7,142
- Our 5 year strategic plan addresses the timing of projects that would impact our reserve balance(s). Mailbox replacement remains a concern with an estimated cost of \$20k
- As of mid January we have received the vast majority of our HOA dues, we anticipate the balance by January month end
- We have larger landscape projects completed, pending or under review this year which include removal of trees at risk, Observation Ave storm pond cleanup, WA Court circle area refresh, Sundown Court circle plant replacement and potential lighting upgrades in the WA Blvd median
- SCHOA resident directories will be updated at the end of January and can be found under the password protected portion of the SCHOA website

Landscape Committee Update

- The Board has decided to continue using Pro-Scapes as our HOA communal landscape management company. The contract will start March 1st. Final details are still being worked out
- Sunset Cove HOA is surrounded by buffers that we maintain, and those of other entities. The committee will post a map of the adjacent buffers with contact information of whom to talk to regarding problem vegetation
- The native plant list will undergo updates and enhancements during the 1st quarter. We will add additional deer resistant plants and other species that do well in our neighborhood. If you have a plant type in your yard that grows well and tolerates occasional deer browsing, please let us know!
- Replacement of the plants that died in last years cold snap will be evaluated this quarter. Planning is underway, and most likely will entail the volunteer opportunity to assist with the planting of new vegetation. Please let us know if you are interested in assisting with this project and future projects





Neighborhood Updates

- As Winter continues, we are still dealing with waning daylight, black ice and less than desirable driving conditions. With few streetlights let's be mindful of the speed limit in our community which is 25 MPH. We've also got kids and adults playing in the streets which supports driving at the speed limit or below.
- Yard maintenance-As temps begin to increase later this winter and Spring it becomes increasingly important to stay on top of yard maintenance and storm damage from downed limbs, old yard debris and dead or dying plants. Mowing, pruning and debris removal from your yards is a must. Should you be struggling with yard maintenance the Board can recommend a number of local landscapers and maintenance companies to use.
- Habitat for deer-We all enjoy seeing deer in the immediate area. That said, let's not make it a practice to feed them. Rats, mice, etc. also like what deer eat; lets avoid an infestation by not feeding them.



- Trash disposal and pick up-Friday is trash pick up day for our neighborhood. Let's respect the appearance of Sunset Cove and bag all trash for pickup. Let's also be mindful of returning trash cans to an area on your property not visible to the public. For large trash and debris removal you can also use the following facility:

- Our street trees were pruned in September of 2022 by a group of neighborhood volunteers. A big shout out to Steve and Linda Krippner, Paul Allen, and Claire and Carl Colson for there help. Volunteers play a big role keeping our community looking great and safe for all residents.



Neighborhood Updates

Sidewalk clearance for walkers-Its that time of the year when our daylight hours are shorter and the weather is a mixed bag of cold and rain. Residents still like to get out and walk pet's, hike and look for general exercise traversing the neighborhood.

If you have plantings that encroach onto the sidewalks let's be mindful of others and prune them back for ease of access. It's a great time of the year to be outside enjoying the neighborhood.

- Construction update-Currently there is 1 home under construction (combined lots WPE 9 & 10). Let's be mindful of any construction debris that you encounter in the street or on the sidewalks and move it back onto the lot(s). Nails, screws, utility knife blades etc. should be discarded in the trash receptacles located on the lot(s). Thanks in advance for your help.
- Pets-For those of us that walk pets in the neighborhood it is our responsibility to clean up after them. Let's all pitch in!
- The mailbox locks have just been lubricated for the Fall and Winter seasons. If you have problems with your lock, please email the Board at <u>board@sunsetcove.org</u>.



- Observation Ave. fire access lane-The City of Anacortes was out in Sept to cut back the brush in the fire access lane and install a chain fence to prohibit motorized vehicle access. Let's be mindful of this area as it is part of our community and HOA.
- Pickleball Courts-For those of you that enjoy the game of pickleball there are 10 covered courts located at the Blackburn Pavilion in Mount Vernon, 2405 E College Way. Free and open to the public on a daily basis. Seven courts are reserved for members of the Skagit Valley Pickleball Club during morning and afternoon blocks of time. The courts are otherwise available on a first come first serve basis.
- Several residents have noticed an increase in coyote sightings in the recent past. Like other canids, coyotes don't hibernate. They remain active throughout the year and increase their level of activity in the colder months. Coyotes are more active in the Winter not only because they spend more time searching for food but because their young disperse from groups which happens mostly from October to January. A reminder for pet owners, please be cautious. Winter/Spring Best Practices



Spring Maintenance Checklist

- Inspect gutters for debris and damage
- Inspect exterior windows and doors for damage and wear
- Inspect roof and siding for damage
- Inspect underground sprinkler system and make ready for use
- Inspect decks/railings and clean and or refinish as needed
- Inspect for pest infestations
- Clean out interior HVAC vents
- Change furnace filter(s)
- Change batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors
- Clean lint trap from dryer vent
- Tune up power equipment: Change oil, spark plugs, sharpen blades and chains, remove old gas before starting
- Check garden hose connections, insert new washers if needed
- Rake up debris, moss and dead grass from lawns
- Remove dead plants from landscape
- Fertilize lawn
- Add mulch to garden beds and other landscaped areas

- Prune trees, shrubs & grasses growing into your house or garage
- Remove frost covers from exterior hose bibs when temps allow
- Clean grill(s) and check propane connection
- Fill or replace propane tank(s)

Take a loop drive around the beautiful Washington Park Anacortes.

Washington Park is 1.5 hours north of Seattle, directly west of <u>Anacortes</u> overlooking the Rosario Strait.

It offers stunning views of the San Juan Islands around a 2.2 mile paved Loop Road.

Visitors can drive or bike around the one-way Loop Road, or park at the entrance and walk in. There's also a network of dirt trails, but these are not suitable for children due to sheer drop offs.

The day use area at the entrance has a boat launch, picnic tables, restrooms and a playground. Overnight <u>camping</u> is also available near the entrance of Washington Park.







The 5 Best Scenic Opportunities at WA Park

1. Follow the signs to the start of the Loop Road (2.2. miles).

The Loop Road begins just past the day use area and boat launch at Sunset Beach, on the western side of Anacortes. This day use area is the perfect place for a picnic, with gorgeous views, sheltered tables, lots of open space to fly kites, and a playground. You can also enjoy the beautiful beach.

2. Continue along the Northern side of Washington Park.

The first stretch of the Loop Road travels along the northern side of Washington Park, with peep through views of the coast through thick forest. This is a super narrow road, but thankfully it's one-way! The speed limit is only 10 miles per hour, and you will often encounter hikers along the road. There are a few dirt pull-outs for parking, leading to glorious views of Guemes Island, Blakely Island and Cypress Island.



3. As the road winds around the western side of Washington Park Anacortes, there's a set of stairs down to a beach with tessellated rock formations.





4. A grassed area soon becomes visible, with picnic tables overlooking Burrows Island. Burrows Island is just one of 172 islands in the San Juan Islands archipelago, and has a beautiful lighthouse, unfortunately not visible from the road. There are also distant views of <u>Mt Erie</u>, that you can drive to the top of!

5. The southern section of Loop Road travels away from the coast to the interior of Washington Park through thick coastal forest, back to the parking







Things to do near Washington Park

After visiting Washington Park at the west end of Anacortes, drive to the viewpoint at *Cap Santa Park* in Anacortes, for superb views of Mt Baker, the Cascades, and the marina.

Then drive 5 minutes south of Anacortes to the summit of <u>Mt Erie</u>, the highest point on Fidalgo Island. Continue south to <u>Deception Pass</u>, a spectacular strait between Fidalgo Island and Whidbey Island. Finish the day by having a meal at Anthony's Restaurant in Anacortes, with superb waterside views.

If you have a few more days, travel 20-minutes southwest of Anacortes to explore the gift shops, boutiques and galleries at <u>La Conner</u>, or take the ferry from Anacortes to *Orcas Island* or *San Juan Island*. Alternatively, cross the Deception Pass Bridge to <u>Whidbey</u> <u>Island</u>. Travel down Whidbey Island to explore the lovely villages of Coupeville and Langley, Greenbank Farm, the Lavender Wind Farm, and the lighthouse at Fort Casey.

Washington State Ferries

Getting here is half the fun aboard a Washington State Ferry! Take a scenic ride through the islands as you make your way to your final destination. You can drive your car right onto the boat, or board as a foot passenger and simply walk on. The ferries run year-round and there are several sailings each day to and from each of the four main islands - Lopez, Orcas, San Juan, and Shaw. An interisland ferry allows island hoppers to travel between the islands and an international ferry offers service to Sidney, B.C. March - December.

All San Juan Islands ferries depart from the Anacortes Ferry Terminal located at 2100 Ferry Terminal Rd, Anacortes, WA 98221. Allow a comfortable 2 - 3 hours to enjoy the drive and the scenery from Seattle or Vancouver B.C. Make sure this includes enough time to arrive 30-minutes before departure for your reservation check-in.
