



Treasurer Update

- ➤ Total assets on hand as of January 1st, 2024 are \$29,798.42. Working balance \$7.210.45, unallocated reserve balance \$22,587.97
- Our 5 year strategic plan addresses the timing of projects that would impact our reserve balance. Mailbox replacement remains a concern with an estimated cost of \$20k over the next 4-5 years
- The 2024 annual assessment has a due date of February 15th 2024. The assessment mailing will go out after the 2024 annual meeting
- Dues were raised from \$300 to \$400 per annum to cover the increasing cost of services due to inflation and planned projects for 2024/25
- We have larger landscape projects completed, pending or under review this year which include buffer zone assessment, WA Court circle area refresh, WA Blvd street tree test
- SCHOA resident directories will be updated at the end of January and can be found under the password protected portion of the SCHOA website

Washington State Master Gardeners





What is a Master Gardener?

Master Gardeners are community educators trained to work in partnership with WSU Extension to teach the public and enhance the quality of life in the community by promoting sound gardening practices with research-based information. From big box retailers to smaller IGC garden center formats, Masters Gardeners contribute their time and knowledge with in-house educators to meet, teach and train shoppers of all ages. Having Master Gardeners available in a retail setting is a golden opportunity to learn the latest trends in gardening.

The Certification Process

The application deadline in Skagit County is October 31 for training which begins in January. Applicants are interviewed during November. The cost of the Master Gardener education is \$400. A refund of \$100 is returned to the Master Gardener once the required volunteer time is completed by the end of their intern year.

The Skagit County Master Gardener program starts with a 12-week course combining classroom and online computer based education. The weekly classes are held on Mondays at the Padilla Bay Interpretive Center, beginning mid-January. The curriculum includes lectures in botany, horticulture, soil science, sustainable garden management, integrated pest management, plant health, pesticide safety, entomology, pest management, plant pathology, plant disease diagnosis and control, weed identification, tree fruit and small fruit production.

After completing the academic syllabus, Master Gardener Interns must complete 60 hours of supervised learning to become fully certified. This hands-on training is completed at plant diagnostic clinics, the Discovery Garden, and other community outreach and education events such as rain garden education, community school gardens, farmers markets, and the Skagit County Fair.

After qualification, MGs must complete 25 hours of public service annually, including 4 hours of educational outreach to the public and 10 hours of MG continuing education to maintain their certification. Volunteers often give back much more!

Neighborhood Updates

- As Winter continues, we are still dealing with waning daylight, black ice and less than desirable driving conditions. With few streetlights let's be mindful of the speed limit in our community which is 25 MPH. We've also got kids and adults playing in the streets which supports driving at the speed limit or below.
- Yard maintenance-As temps begin to increase later this winter and Spring it becomes increasingly important to stay on top of yard maintenance and storm damage from downed limbs, old yard debris and dead or dying plants. Mowing, pruning and debris removal from your yards is a must. Should you be struggling with yard maintenance the Board can recommend a number of local landscapers and maintenance companies to use.
- ➤ Habitat for deer-We all enjoy seeing deer in the immediate area. That said, let's not make it a practice to feed them. Rats, mice, etc. also like what deer eat; lets avoid an infestation by not feeding them.



Frash disposal and pick up-Friday is trash pick up day for our neighborhood. Let's respect the appearance of Sunset Cove and bag all trash for pickup. - Sidewalk clearance for walkers-Its that time of the year when our daylight hours are shorter and the weather is a mixed bag of cold and rain. Residents still like to get out and walk pet's, hike and look for general exercise traversing the neighborhood.
 If you have plantings that encroach onto the sidewalks let's be mindful of others and prune them back for ease of access. It's a great time of the year to be outside enjoying the neighborhood.
- Construction update-Currently there is 1 home under construction (lot SCE #6). Let's be mindful of any construction debris that you encounter in the street or on the sidewalks and move it back onto the lot. Nails, screws, utility knife blades etc. should be discarded in the trash receptacles located on the lot. Thanks in advance for your help.
- Pets-For those of us that walk pets in the neighborhood it is your responsibility to clean up after them. Let's all pitch in!
- The mailbox locks have just been lubricated for the Fall and Winter seasons. If you have problems with your lock, please email the Board at board@sunsetcove.org.



- Observation Ave. fire access lane-The City of Anacortes was out in August to cut back the brush in the fire access lane. Let's be mindful of this area keeping it free of pet waste. It is part of our community and HOA.
- Pickleball Courts-For those of you that enjoy the game of pickleball there are 10 covered courts located at the Blackburn Pavilion in Mount Vernon, 2405 E College Way. Free and open to the public on a daily basis. Seven courts are reserved for members of the Skagit Valley Pickleball Club during morning and afternoon blocks of time. The courts are otherwise available on a first come first serve basis.
- Several residents have noticed an increase in coyote sightings in the recent past. Like other canids, **coyotes don't hibernate**. They remain active throughout the year and increase their level of activity in the colder months. Coyotes are more active in the Winter not only because they spend more time searching for food but because their young disperse from groups which happens mostly from October to January. A reminder for pet owners, please be cautious. Winter/Spring Best Practices

Spring Maintenance Checklist

- Inspect gutters for debris and damage
- Inspect exterior windows and doors for damage and wear
- Inspect roof and siding for damage
- Inspect underground sprinkler system and make ready for use
- Inspect decks/railings and clean and or refinish as needed
- Inspect for pest infestations
- Clean interior HVAC vents
- Change furnace filter(s)
- Change batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors
- Clean lint trap from dryer vent
- Tune up power equipment: Change oil, spark plugs, sharpen blades and chains, remove old gas before starting
- Check garden hose connections, insert new washers if needed
- Rake up debris, moss and dead grass from lawns
- Remove dead plants from landscape
- Fertilize lawn
- Add mulch to garden beds and other landscaped areas

Spring Maintenance Checklist-cont'd

- Prune trees, shrubs & grasses growing into your house or garage
- Remove frost covers from exterior hose bibs when temps allow
- Clean grill(s) and check propane connection
- Fill or replace propane tank(s)

Travel prep demands both planning and dreaming, and Experience Anacortes is your guide to get started doing both. Read on to discover some of the many things you can enjoy while visiting this vibrant seacoa

Anacortes, the crown jewel of Fidalgo Island, is conveniently situated halfway between Seattle & Vancouver BC, and is the destination point for the San Juan Islands and International Ferry runs. The island is known for its historic waterfront, 50-miles of hiking trails, and a mix of annual festivals.

Its year-round music scene is lively, and visitors can soak up a range of tunes from rock to bluegrass to jazz at outside venues during the summer and restaurants and bars throughout the year. The culinary scene is evergrowing, and you'll find a variety of restaurants with farm-to-table menus, scratch and house-made ingredients, and their specialties like BBQ, fusion, and rustic scratch.

Hiking Anacortes Community Forest Lands - Little Cranberry Lake

Set off for a hike in the Anacortes Community Forest Lands (ACFL), a 2,800-acre preserve within the city limits of Anacortes.

These lands hold 20 miles of trails and are the beloved treasure of local residents. Originally a pond, the lake was dammed in the early 1900s. You'll actually cross over the dam at the north end of the lake on your hike. In 1921, a portion of the dam gave way, and the waters of the lake poured northward into the bay, temporarily trapping workers in shoreline canneries.

With ten different access points in the neighborhoods surrounding Little Cranberry Lake, this destination is a great option for people living in or visiting friends in Anacortes. The trailhead accessible via the graveled Cranberry Lake Road has room for 15 to 20 cars, and its proximity to benches and views of the lake make it a great option for picnickers.

A trailhead kiosk holds a trail map, but you can buy ACFL maps at the parks department, the Anacortes visitors center or at several local stores, and you definitely need one to navigate the network of trails that crisscross this park.

It is possible to do a 1.73 mile loop around the lake, but note that the trail on the east side of the lake is quite close to the water—in some places footing is tricky, and it may not be a great option for those with small children. However, there are plenty of lakeside spots near the north end of the lake that make great destinations for families and little explorers.

If it's a loop you want, and you're confident in your footing, follow Trail 100 over the spillway near the parking lot and past the deck, stopping to snap a picture of the lake from the wooden overlook. Continue on Trail 100 around a small inlet full of logs, then turn left and uphill onto Trail 103.

Experience Anacortes-Little Cranberry Lake!







Switchback up and then traverse this trail for a half mile, passing through madronas and cedars along a ridgeline above the lake. Once there was a view of the lake here, but the trees have grown up enough that your first good views only come on your descent. Once you reach a junction, turn right, and at a "T" intersection at the lakeshore, turn left, following a bridge over a swampy area on Trail 132. This is the connection between Little Cranberry Lake and Big Beaver Pond.

Once over the bridge, the trail becomes slightly more rugged, dipping very near the lake at points and becoming more brushy than it has been so far. Hike along Trail 132 and then bear right onto Trail 101, which stays close to the west side of the lake. The quality of trail improves as you near the north end of the lake. Picnic opportunities abound here, with slabs of rock and moss providing good places to rest, recline and take in the views under bright madrone trees. After hiking a little more than a half-mile, find yourself back at the parking lot, and your car.

The trail is edged with salal and mixed second-growth forest. Small boggy islands in the lake contain distinctive wetland plants such as bog cranberry, bog laurel and Labrador tea. Keep an eye out for signs of beaver or river otter, and bring binoculars to identify waterfowl.

Booking activities, lodging, and dining in advance will make your trip run smoothly and you'll be more likely to get your first picks. Most tour operators have generous cancellation policies in case you need to make changes. (Check with individual companies to be sure of their policies.)

Great Winter Hikes On Orcas Island

Mount Constitution

If you want the challenge of a steep hike and the reward of breathtaking views, grab your hiking boots and a packed lunch and head to Mount Constitution in Moran State Park, the highest point in the San Juan Islands—2,409 feet. It's not a hike to be rushed, however, as there is a lot to appreciate on the way up. Hike from the cool shade of oldgrowth forest to sunshine and wildflowers in alpine meadows.

From the summit, you'll have 360-degree views of the San Juan Islands, Vancouver, and the mainland, bracketed by snow-tipped Mt. Baker and Mt. Rainier. Enjoy an added touch of historical interest in the watchtower, built from hand-cut stone by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1936.

If you have small children or just fancy something less strenuous, there are a multitude of easier hikes farther down the mountain. Or arrange to be dropped off at the top and have someone pick you up at the bottom for a leisurely downhill hike.

There is a paved road all the way up Mount Constitution, so consider parking partway up for a leisurely and beautiful three-mile stroll around Mountain Lake—you can even jump in for a cooling swim. Beyond Mountain Lake, trails lead out to Cascade Falls and Twin Lakes. With over 38 miles of trails, 5,200-acre Moran State Park offers something for every fitness level.

Turtleback Mountain

The distinctively shaped Turtleback Mountain is a much-loved area for hikers—at 1,520 feet, the second-highest summit in the islands. For hikers and nature lovers, that translates into fantastic views and fascinating flora and fauna. The south-end approach, up the turtle's "head," is for those willing to tackle a steep ascent. You'll enjoy wide-open vistas for much of the climb, but this also means more exposure to the sun.

For those less inclined to pant up an exposed climb, choose the north ascent. Here, conifer forest and wetlands replace the grasslands and Garry oaks of the south face.

Obstruction Pass State Park

Obstruction Pass is a small gem for those seeking the atmosphere of a wilderness escape. Situated at the far southeastern tip of Orcas, Obstruction Pass offers 80 acres of parkland to explore plus 10 primitive campsites. The main trails run well under a mile through lush vegetation and forest.

The easterly trail leads to a 150-yard beach unique in the islands, covered with marble-sized multicolored pebbles—as well as views of Lopez Island, Blakely Island, and Obstruction Island. The westerly trail ends in a panoramic water view and great picnic site.

Great Winter Hikes On Lopez Island

Shark Reef Sanctuary

Don't miss the Shark Reef Sanctuary on the west side of the island. A short 10-minute walk through a forest will lead to a rocky shoreline where you'll get views over the water and an almost certain seal (and perhaps sea lion, otter, or whale) sighting —just be sure to follow the path around to the left!

Begin your journey through a thick forest carpeted in salal. After a short descent, reach the rocky shoreline (elev. 20 feet) and turn south to reach the ledges along Cattle Pass. From here you can see the strong currents separating Lopez from San Juan Island. Directly in front of you in the channel are Deadman Island and a series of reefs and offshore rocks. At low tide, these areas teem with wildlife - eagles, cormorants, kingfishers, and oystercatchers dining on seafood, and seals basking on the warm rocks. Shark Reef Sanctuary is an excellent destination for children and adults seeking outdoor discovery.

Across the channel on San Juan Island, Mount Finlayson rises above Cattle Point Lighthouse in the foreground. Mount Dallas, the highest point on San Juan Island, can be seen in the distance. Looking south you'll find the Olympic Mountains looming over the Strait of Juan de Fuca and east to Iceberg Point.

One of Lopez Island's most popular hiking destinations, Shark Reef sanctuary was once a military post. Now the 39-acre sanctuary is a San Juan County Park.

Hummel Lake Preserve

Located on the south end of Lopez Island's largest freshwater lake, 80-acre Hummel Lake Preserve boasts beautiful lakefront shoreline, a dock for fishing (but no swimming), and about two miles of trails through a second-growth forest that ends at Port Stanley Road. Enjoy quiet woodland roaming where you're more likely to run into deer than other hikers. Walk through a cedar grove, a mature Douglas fir forest, and watch for local birds as you experience Lopez's slower pace of life.

Fish species include largemouth bass, bluegill and planted rainbow trout.

Upright Head Preserve

Upright Head Preserve is the northernmost point on Lopez Island and is an important landmark recognized by many who travel the state ferry system. This 26-acre property includes 2,023 feet of medium and high-bank waterfront on Harney and Upright Channels. A small rocky preserve, protected by the San Juan County Landbank, Upright Head is a perfect place to watch boat traffic and wait for a ferry.

The 1.2 mile roundtrip hike is an easy walk from the ferry lanes and gains only 300 feet of elevation. The trail starts on the west side of the ferry terminal road, on a gated road signed "Penny Lane." Along the trail you'll find look outs, educational signs, and a wooden platform perfect for a picnic. Protecting this land prevents development and secures otter habitat, old growth forest, and interesting geological features.

Fisherman Bay Preserve

Fisherman Bay Preserve is a 29-acre property that includes open meadows, woodlands, wetlands, and approximately 1 mile of shoreline. A sandy spit marks the entrance to Fisherman Bay and is a beautiful place for a picnic.

On the way to the preserve, you'll pass Otis Perkins Day Park. Stop here for even more shoreline and beach to explore. As you follow the signs to the preserve, you'll drive through a residential neighborhood. Upon reaching the small parking lot for the preserve, you'll find an outhouse and educational panels.

The preserve offers about a mile of trails with only 20 feet of elevation gain. Pass through an old orchard, stone ruins of a Lopez homestead, and through meadows of wildflowers. Enjoy views of Orcas Island's Turtleback Mountain rising behind Shaw Island and wave to passing boats headed to Lopez Village.

Great Winter Hikes On San Juan Island Young Hill

If you want to wear hiking boots, experience some history, and see views that take your breath away, tackle Young Hill Situated at the north end of the island, the 650-foot summit offers unmatched panoramas of San Juan, Canada's Gulf Islands, Vancouver Island, and beyond. Pick up the trailhead across the road from **English Camp**, occupied by the British in 1860 and find traces of its history on Mount Young itself—watch for the 1860s Royal Marine Cemetery.

Distance: 2.2 miles Elevation gain: 600 ft

From the parking lot at English Camp, find the trail in the eastern corner of the lot and head southeast. At the first branch in the trail, stay right, and the trail will start climbing almost immediately. Cross San Juan Valley Road at 0.3 miles. and continue until you see a signed path leading to the English Camp cemetery. This piece of history is worth a stop as you ascend or descend Young Hill. A memorial to seven Royal Marines who died on the island in the 1860s, this cemetery is surrounded by gnarled Garry Oaks that are part of an ongoing restoration project.

After your side trip to the cemetery, head back to the main trail and continue climbing. You will reach your first viewpoint at 0.8 miles with an informative plaque naming some geographic features visible on a clear day. Keep climbing, and at 1.0 miles reach the summit, with spectacular views of the Salish Sea and surrounding islands. If you've brought lunch, settle down and enjoy some of the best views in the area. You have the world at your feet. You can also hike **from English Camp to Westcott Bay Shellfish Farm**, through lush forests and along the water.

Lime Kiln Point State Park

Also known as Whale Watch Park, <u>Lime Kiln Point State Park</u> is a 36-acre day-use park with an iconic lighthouse set on the west side of San Juan Island. You may see orca whales swimming through the kelp beds in the waters off Lime Kiln, looking for salmon, since this park is considered one of the best places in the world to view whales from land. The shoreline viewpoint is about a 300-yard walk from the parking lot, restrooms, and seasonal interpretive center.

Distance: 2.2 miles Elevation gain: 265 ft

The park, which features a richly diverse environment, includes the remnants and landscapes of a history filled with change, along the rocky shoreline and through the wooded uplands. Minke whales, porpoises, seals, sea lions, otters and bald eagles also cruise the shoreline. The lighthouse was built in 1919 and still serves as a navigational beacon for ships in the Haro Strait. Interpretive programs, an interpretive center with gift shop and lighthouse tours are available during the summer months.

South Beach & American Camp

SOUTH BEACH AND AMERICAN CAMP

South Beach in American Camp National Historical Park is the longest public beach in the islands, with views over the Strait of Juan de Fuca to the Olympic Mountains. All along this pristine two-mile pebble-and-sand beach, a wide swath of massive driftwood has washed up and been bleached in the sun for decades.

Distance: 2.8 miles Elevation gain: 180 ft

A wonderful place to take photos, enjoy a brisk walk for exercise, or a slow stroll for beachcombing, South Beach also has broad golden hills where eagles and hawks reel, rabbits forage and red foxes hunt at sunset, a historic "redoubt" or temporary fortification made during the Pig War conflict between the American and English troops from 1859 to 1871 – a standoff during which no shots were fired. Now, the only flames you'll see are the summer bonfires at sunset as locals and visitors gather to enjoy this stunning and special place.

WSDOT Ferry System

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If you're heading to the islands plan ahead!



Washington State Ferries

Getting here is half the fun aboard a Washington State Ferry! Take a scenic ride through the islands as you make your way to your final destination. You can drive your car right onto the boat, or board as a foot passenger and simply walk on. The ferries run year-round and there are several sailings each day to and from each of the four main islands - Lopez, Orcas, San Juan, and Shaw. An interisland ferry allows island hoppers to travel between the islands and an international ferry offers service to Sidney, B.C. March - December.

All San Juan Islands ferries depart from the Anacortes Ferry Terminal located at 2100 Ferry Terminal Rd, Anacortes, WA 98221. Allow a comfortable 2 - 3 hours to enjoy the drive and the scenery from Seattle or Vancouver B.C. Make sure this includes enough time to arrive 30-minutes before departure for your reservation check-in.
