

# Fidalgo Island

Fidalgo Island is an island in Skagit County Washington, located about 60 mi (97 km) north of Seattle. To the east, it is separated from the mainland by the Swinomish Channel, and from Whidbey Island to the south by Deception Pass. The island is named after the Spanish explorer and cartographer Salvador Fidalgo who explored the area in 1790.

Its largest and only city is Anacortes with a population of 18,121 at the end of the 2024. Anacortes has ferries with daily service to the San Juan Islands and Guemes Island.

From 1924 to 1935, Fidalgo Island was linked to Whidbey Island by the Deception Pass ferry, which was superseded in 1935 by the completion of the Deception Pass Bridge. Today, Fidalgo Island is the site of the ferry terminal that links Anacortes to Vancouver Island and the San Juan Islands to the rest of the state.



Fidalgo Island has a land area of 106.684 km² (41.19 sq mi). There are at least eight major lakes on Fidalgo Island which are named Campbell, Erie, Heart, Little Cranberry, Mud, Pass, Trafton/Crater, and Whistle.

### **Treasurer Update**



- ➤ Total assets on hand as of April 1st, 2025 are \$50,246.96. Working balance \$26,239.12, unallocated reserve balance \$24,007.84.
- We transferred 2024 checking surplus to reserves in the amount of \$12,720.55. This will help build reserves for future projects.
- > We have filed the SCHOA annual report with the Secretary of State.
- ProScapes failed to winterize and turn off our irrigation system. Water bills on city invoices remained high which is how we caught the error. We negotiated with ProScapes to have the January turn off cost waived with the SCHOA covering the extra water expense.
- Phase 2 of the DNR fuel reduction project was completed in February 2025, trimming tree limbs and brush for forest fire mitigation. We will work with the DNR on phase 3 in 2026. The SCHOA and the 3 smaller HOA's split the chipper and refreshment cost of \$211.33 each.
- SCHOA resident directories will be updated soon and will available on the SCHOA website.

### **DNR Update-Sunset Cove Project**

A big shout out for your SCHOA Treasurer Dawn Bachmann for the work she has done with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) cleaning up tract D of the perimeter buffer zone. The project started as a fact finding mission with the Conservation District of Skagit and Whatcom counties to assess fire risk in buffer zone Tracts C and D. Since Sunset Cove property backs up to the Western Washington University Shannon Point Marine Center property line Dawn spent a great deal of time working with the DNR, WWU and the Conservation District of Skagit and Whatcom counties to coordinate the project. The end result of the project was cleaning up brush and limbing trees to mitigate our fire risk in heavily wooded areas of Sunset Cove; Tract C was completed in 2024.

Other contributors to the project were Bev Bothel and Pam Doddridge from The Crest and Liana Yelle our SCHOA Landscape Chair. The cost of the work was minimal; the DNR associates volunteered their time and the cost of the chipper rental and refreshments for the DNR associates came to \$832. The cost was split between the 4 HOA's.....The Gardens, The Crest, Doe Run and Sunset Cove.

Dear Mr. Upthegrove:

I am writing you to compliment the staff of the WA State Department of Natural Resources. This is our 2<sup>nd</sup> year working with the DNR in your Fuel Reduction program. We are 4 small HOAs in Anacortes, WA, with 86 dwellings (homes and condominiums) surrounded by dense forest.

The DNR team led by Nolan Parry included Mac Zavala, Amedeo Conta, Clare Seitzer-Jones, Ashley Sytsma, Elliot Vahl, and Brady Otto. The initial scoping of the project was with Dylan Van Pelt, Josh Etringer, and Nolan Parry. We also appreciated the responsive initial contact with Gene Phillips, Ian McLelland, and Dylan Van Pelt.





The four HOA communities Sunset Cove, Doe Run, The Gardens, and The Crest were so enthusiastic about the 2024 project with the DNR. In 2024 the DNR thinned the East forest-edge surrounding the HOAs. On February 19, 2025 the DNR thinned the North forest-edge. Our community is privileged to have a State Agency with such quality staff to help us proactively work to protect our homes from potential forest fire.

We cannot give enough praise to your team. They are

professional, kind to our neighbors, hard working and have a great sense of humor. We have so many great stories from working with your crew. Last year the rented chipper was returned broken hours before we were to pick it up. Your crew asked how many beavers we could fit into our truck. This year the crew dragged trees through the woods to protect the landscaped grass area closer to the homes. Their dedication to high quality work and affinity to the forest was obvious.

# **Spring Best Practices**

### **Spring Maintenance Checklist**

- Inspect and clean gutters
- Wash windows and screens and screen doors
- Power wash driveways and sidewalks
- Inspect HVAC system and perform annual maintenance
- Inspect decks/railings and clean and or refinish as needed
- Clean and stage outdoor furniture
- Treat exterior of foundation with pesticide to prevent infestation(s)
- Tune up power equipment: Change oil, spark plugs, sharpen blades and chains etc
- Remove old gas from power equipment unless previously stabilized
- Check garden hose connections, insert new washers if needed
- Remove dead plants from your landscape
- Prune trees, shrubs & grasses as needed
- Fertilize lawn with spring rated fertilizer
- Add mulch to garden beds and other landscaped areas
- Clean grill(s) and check propane connection
- Fill or replace propane tank(s)

#### What is a Master Gardener?

Master Gardeners are community educators trained to work in partnership with WSU Extension to teach the public and enhance the quality of life in the community by promoting sound gardening practices with research-based information. From big box retailers to smaller IGC garden center formats, Masters Gardeners contribute their time and knowledge with in-house educators to meet, teach and train shoppers of all ages. Having Master Gardeners available in a retail setting is a golden opportunity to learn the latest trends in gardening.

# Want to Become a Master Gardener? Sign up for WSU Skagit County Master Gardener Training

#### **The Certification Process**

The application deadline in Skagit County is October 31 for training which begins in January. Applicants are interviewed during November. The cost of the Master Gardener education is \$400. A refund of \$100 is returned to the Master Gardener once the required volunteer time is completed by the end of their intern year.

The Skagit County Master Gardener program starts with a 12-week course combining classroom and online computer based education. The weekly classes are held on Mondays at the Padilla Bay Interpretive Center, beginning mid-January. The curriculum includes lectures in botany, horticulture, soil science, sustainable garden management, integrated pest management, plant health, pesticide safety, entomology, pest management, plant pathology, plant disease diagnosis and control, weed identification, tree fruit and small fruit production.

After completing the academic syllabus, Master Gardener Interns must complete 60 hours of supervised learning to become fully certified. This hands-on training is completed at plant diagnostic clinics, the Discovery Garden, and other community outreach and education events such as rain garden education, community school gardens, farmers markets, and the Skagit County Fair.

After qualification, MGs must complete 25 hours of public service annually, including 4 hours of educational outreach to the public and 10 hours of MG continuing education to maintain their certification. Volunteers often give back much more!

Travel prep demands both planning and dreaming, and Experience Anacortes is your guide to get started doing both. Read on to discover some of the many things you can enjoy while visiting this vibrant seacoast town.

Anacortes, the crown jewel of Fidalgo Island, is conveniently situated halfway between Seattle & Vancouver BC, and is the destination point for the San Juan Islands and International Ferry runs. The island is known for its historic waterfront, 50-miles of hiking trails, and a mix of annual festivals.

Its year-round music scene is lively and visitors can soak up a range of tunes from rock to bluegrass to jazz at outside venues during the summer and restaurants and bars throughout the year. The culinary scene is ever-growing and you'll find a variety of restaurants with farm-to-table menus, scratch and house-made ingredients, and their specialties like BBQ, fusion, and rustic scratch.



# Experience Anacortes-Mt Erie

### Mount Erie frames the skyline of Skagit County, known as one of the Anacortes area's most recognizable landmarks

- The mountain is believed to have been formed during the Jurassic Period and was named in modern times by members of the Wilkes Expedition in 1841.
- Since the 1960s, it has been a popular climbing spot in Washington State, offering stunning panoramic views of its surrounding areas from its summit.
- Its surrounding lands are operated as a city park by the City of Anacortes and are accessible by hikers throughout the year.
- Visitors can climb a moderately-strenuous trail to the top of the summit or connect to the Sugarloaf Summit Trail halfway through the climb for additional panoramic views.





# Experience Anacortes-Rosario Beach




Rosario Beach is a beautiful sandy cove along the southwestern edge of Fidalgo Island, known for its extensive beachfront stretches and charming wildlife

- The beach area is believed to have been occupied for at least 3,000 years, originally used by regional Coast Salish Samish indigenous tribes as a hunting and fishing site.
- Today, the beach's Maiden of Deception Pass story pole carvings honor Samish legends connected to the beach area, a remnant of development of the area in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps.
- A former kitchen shelter developed by the CCC has been converted into a field classroom today.
- Gorgeous century-old trees frame the beachfront, while an overlooking meadowy bluff is populated by beautiful wildflowers throughout the summer months.

This hike is a flat 3.3 mile one way blacktop trail that starts at The Port of Anacortes and ends at March Point near The Shell and Tesoro Refineries. The trail has great views of Mount Baker, Fidalgo Bay and lots of blue heron, especially when the tides are low.

Rarely do hikers have the opportunity to traverse a magnificent bay on an abandoned railroad trestle, but this paved rail trail offers just that. Keep an eye out for marine life. You may see a sea lion staring back at you as you stroll across the trestle connecting the eastern and western shores of Fidalgo Bay.

The Tommy Thompson Trail starts at the intersection of 11th Avenue and Q Street in Anacortes. The blacktop heads south along Q Avenue. After 7 blocks, the trail heads diagonally east and the street changes names to R Avenue. After 0.6 mile, the trail passes the access point at the intersection of 22nd Street and R Avenue. There is a restroom here. Heading south again, the trail passes a public restroom at 30th Avenue. In another 0.7 mile from 22nd Avenue, the trail reaches 34th Street. Continuing south, the trail traverses the western shore of Fidalgo Bay. Looking across the bay on a clear day, there are views of Mount Baker on the distant eastern horizon.

After another mile from 34th Street, the trail passes an RV park. A majestic totem pole stands next to the trail. After crossing Weaverling Road at the RV park, there is an ADA accessible port-a-potty next to the blacktop. Beyond the RV park, the trail heads in a southeasterly direction and crosses Fidalgo Bay on a rocky causeway and then a wooden trestle.

Your turnaround point is March Point Road on the eastern shore of Fidalgo Bay. The trail crosses an additional mile between the RV Park and March Point Road.





## San Juan Islands









#### **About the San Juan Islands**

Count on temperatures around 70° in the summer and 40° in the winter. A happy confluence of weather systems also accounts for the high level of air quality you'll appreciate across the San Juan's. So, relax—you're on "island time" now!








# San Juan Islands-Lopez Island Cycling





If you start out on **Lopez Island**, the least hilly of the San Juans (but by no means flat), you can cycle the entire island in a day. If you follow the main road around the island, you will enjoy water views at the north and south ends, and there are plenty of stop-offs for picnics, wildlife viewing or short hikes. You'll also pass plenty of farmland, marshlands and other natural areas—if you're here in the late summer bring a bowl and pick blackberries in various spots along the roadside.

From the ferry landing, Lopez Village is 4.3 miles, and along the way, you'll pass Lopez Island Vineyards, Odlin County Park, and the unique Whispers of Nature herbal labyrinth you can walk through, where the only sounds are the bumble bees buzzing through lavender, and goats chatting at a nearby farm.

For a quick side-trip on the way to the Village, take a left onto Port Stanley Road (at the Odlin Park intersection), and head to the east side of the island, where you'll find Spencer Spit State Park, so called because of the lagoon-enclosing sand spit on which it rests.

In the Village, you can stock up on picnic supplies and stop by the Lopez Island Chamber of Commerce for a detailed map of suggested routes. As you head out and explore the island, keep safety in mind and make sure to watch out for blind corners and narrow shoulders that are common on island roads.

Don't miss Shark Reef Sanctuary on the west side of the island, where a 10-minute hike through a forest will lead to large rocky bluffs where you'll get spectacular views over the water to the Olympic Mountains and San Juan Island. You may also experience a seal (and perhaps sea lion and otter) sighting—just be sure to follow the path along the bluff to the left.

One of the prettiest areas on Lopez Island is Agate Beach County Park in the southwestern part of the island, with a lovely beach and rocky bluffs and islands in the distance.

## San Juan Islands-San Juan Island Cycling





San Juan Island is more challenging. You can also circumnavigate this island in a day—the loop and two scenic legs are about 43 miles—but there are enough places of interest along the way that you might want to plan for a couple of days so you can explore the beautiful parks, beaches, and attractions along the way. There are some substantial hills, and many roads with very narrow shoulders, so plan ahead and make sure you keep safety in mind.

This island offers a great 35-mile loop so you can explore without repeating your routes. Head out of Friday Harbor\_on Roche Harbor Road, and enjoy a ride to San Juan Vineyards, where you can take a break for a picnic and sample the winery's wares or buy them by the glass.

But don't tarry too long because you've still got the 6-mile ride to Roche Harbor Resort. You can explore this historic village by bike or foot, as well as the nearby San Juan Islands Sculpture Park—a beautiful 20acre park you'll pass on the way into Roche Harbor, with more than 125 works of art on the shore of Westcott Bay.

Head south about from Roche Harbor about 7.6 miles to English Camp (American Camp is on the south end of the island), and each is famous for the Pig War "Crisis" of 1859-1872. Both National Historical Park locations offer information on this historic event, and each offers some beautiful views and picnic spots, although there are a couple of tough hills to get to both.

One mile down the road from English Camp, stop at Krystal Acres Alpaca Farm & Country Store to see a herd of multi-colored alpacas (who are shorn once a year) and shop for products made from their super soft hair.


About 6.8 miles down West Side Road, Lime Kiln Park State Park, a.k.a. Whale Watch Park, is another must-see spot, so stop off for a picnic, and look for orca whales in the open waters and visit the seasonal interpretative center which offers information on orcas and a history of the lime kilns and the nearby lighthouse. Take a 3.8-mile jog over to Pelindaba Lavender Farm on Wold Road during summer, where you'll find the calming views (and wonderful scents) of rows of lavender, and over 250 lavender products in the aromatic store. Picnic tables are also available.

To see American Camp, keep heading towards Friday Harbor on Bailer Hill Road, take a left on Douglas and a right on Cattle Point Road, which leads you to South Beach, the longest public beach in the islands, with views over the Strait of Juan de Fuca to the Olympic Mountains. Jakle's Lagoon, and the Cattle Point Lighthouse.

Head back up Cattle Point Road, which becomes Argyle Street, which leads back into Friday Harbor (about 9.7 miles)

# San Juan Islands-Orcas Island Cycling





**Orcas Island** is fit for experienced cyclists, as the roads are narrow and winding, with frequent steep grades and few shoulders. If you really want to push yourself, head for the top of Mount Constitution. It will exhaust you, but views from the top of the surrounding area will take away any breath you have left.

If you start from the ferry landing, it is a 9-mile, quite hilly ride to Eastsound, the main village on Orcas Island, right in the center of the island, at the head of East Sound (yes, the town and the water have different spellings). From here you can enjoy a short and easy (compared to the rest of Orcas) loop of six miles out to North Beach, Buckhorn Beach and Crescent Beach.

On the way to Eastsound, you can travel through some beautiful farmland at the base of Turtleback Mountain along Crow Valley Road. Stop to take a hike up the mountain, or stop by Crow Valley School Museum on Crow Valley Road, or a little further afield to Orcas Island Pottery off West Beach Road to view ceramics and sometimes even potters at work.

To the southeast of Eastsound, you'll hit some challenging hills on the way to Moran State Park, passing alongside Cascade Lake, which offers some fabulous views. You'll be able to cool off under the canopy of the forest's trees or take a quick swim. During part of the year, trails are open for mountain biking.

# WSDOT Ferry System

If you're heading to the islands plan ahead!



### Washington State Ferries

Getting here is half the fun aboard a Washington State Ferry! Take a scenic ride through the islands as you make your way to your final destination. You can drive your car right onto the boat, or board as a foot passenger and simply walk on. The ferries run year-round and there are several sailings each day to and from each of the four main islands - Lopez, Orcas, San Juan, and Shaw. An interisland ferry allows island hoppers to travel between the islands and an international ferry offers service to Sidney, B.C. March - December.

All San Juan Islands ferries depart from the Anacortes Ferry Terminal located at 2100 Ferry Terminal Rd, Anacortes, WA 98221. Allow a comfortable 2 - 3 hours to enjoy the drive and the scenery from Seattle or Vancouver B.C. Make sure this includes enough time to arrive 30-minutes before departure for your reservation check-in.
