Fidalgo Island

Fidalgo Island is an island in Skagit County Washington, located about 60 mi (97 km) north of Seattle. To the east, it is separated from the mainland by the Swinomish Channel, and from Whidbey Island to the south by Deception Pass. The island is named after the Spanish explorer and cartographer Salvador Fidalgo who explored the area in 1790.

Its largest and only city is Anacortes with a population of 17,637 at the time of the 2020 Census. Anacortes has ferries with daily service to the San Juan Islands and Guemes Island.

From 1924 to 1935, Fidalgo Island was linked to Whidbey Island by the Deception Pass ferry, which was superseded in 1935 by the completion of the Deception Pass Bridge. Today, Fidalgo Island is the site of the ferry terminal that links Anacortes to Vancouver Island and the San Juan Islands to the rest of the state.



Fidalgo Island has a land area of 106.684 km² (41.19 sq mi). There are at least eight major lakes on Fidalgo Island which are named Campbell, Erie, Heart, Little Cranberry, Mud, Pass, Trafton/Crater, and Whistle.





Treasurer Update

- ➤ Total assets on hand as of June 30, 2025 are \$43,319.91. Working balance \$18,453.51, unallocated Reserve balance \$24,866.40.
- We have incurred unexpected expenses associated with the damage to the Gazebo Trail. While we are awaiting the final resolution of restitution we have been transferring funds to Reserves at 10% of SCHOA income per WA State guidelines, but have been keeping additional Reserve build in checking to cover some of the expenses.
- We have updated our Reserve analysis to support decisions about the timing of the Gazebo Trail repairs.
- HOA dues for 2025 have been paid in full. Thanks everyone.

Approval Requirements For Property Improvements-As a homeowner in Sunset Cove the need often arises to improve the exterior aesthetics of your home. Improvements can include items such as fencing, air conditioner installation and screening around the unit, gates, drainage systems and storage sheds to name a few of the many possible upgrades. Prior to starting on exterior home improvements, the Board suggests that you refer to section 4 of the CC@R's for guidance.

Section 4 has several sub sections (4.1 through 4.8) that explain the submission, review and approval process for projects to the exterior of your home. To make the process seamless the Board has produced and published a "request and approval" form for your use. The form can be found in the HOA Documents section on our website. Click on the icon labeled "SCHOA Project Request and Approval Form" to find it. During the planning process reach out to Board when questions arise. Our intent is to review plans as they are received and act accordingly.

What is a Master Gardener?

Master Gardeners are community educators trained to work in partnership with WSU Extension to teach the public and enhance the quality of life in the community by promoting sound gardening practices with research-based information. From big box retailers to smaller IGC garden center formats, Masters Gardeners contribute their time and knowledge with in-house educators to meet, teach and train shoppers of all ages. Having Master Gardeners available in a retail setting is a golden opportunity to learn the latest trends in gardening.

The Certification Process

The application deadline in Skagit County is October 31 for training which begins in January. Applicants are interviewed during November. The cost of the Master Gardener education is \$400. A refund of \$100 is returned to the Master Gardener once the required volunteer time is completed by the end of their intern year.

The Skagit County Master Gardener program starts with a 12-week course combining classroom and online computer based education. The weekly classes are held on Mondays at the Padilla Bay Interpretive Center, beginning mid-January. The curriculum includes lectures in botany, horticulture, soil science, sustainable garden management, integrated pest management, plant health, pesticide safety, entomology, pest management, plant pathology, plant disease diagnosis and control, weed identification, tree fruit and small fruit production.

After completing the academic syllabus, Master Gardener Interns must complete 60 hours of supervised learning to become fully certified. This hands-on training is completed at plant diagnostic clinics, the Discovery Garden, and other community outreach and education events such as rain garden education, community school gardens, farmers markets, and the Skagit County Fair.

After qualification, MGs must complete 25 hours of public service annually, including 4 hours of educational outreach to the public and 10 hours of MG continuing education to maintain their certification. Volunteers often give back much more!

Summer Cookout Tips and Hacks

Essential Grilling Tools and Accessories

- Gas or charcoal grill
- BBQ thermometer for just the right temperature for all foods
- Charcoal starter can or electric charcoal starter
- Wood chips to increase flavor
- Internal smoker box for the taste you are craving
- Grill rotisserie for evenly done hard to turn meats
- Infrared searing burner
- BBQ griddle
- BBQ ready pizza stone
- Grill tool set and basting brush
- Grill cleaning tools
- Grill rack and roaster
- Grill basket
- Apron and gloves

Essential Grilling Attachments

- Grill mat and pads
- Drip pans
- Smoker box
- Grill cover

10 Tips for Excellent Summer Grilling

- Start with a clean grill. Grills tend to clean up easier when the grill is still warm. Use ½ and onion to clean your grates
- Don't move or flip food unnecessarily, it leads to overcooking
- Don't squeeze or flatten meat, it depletes the juices
- Soak wooden kabob skewers in water for 30 mins prior to use
- Use a meat thermometer and guide for the correct food temps
- Avoid putting cold or frozen food straight onto the grill. Your food will cook evenly if it sits for 30 mins and thaws to room temperature prior to cooking
- Undercook foods slightly to compensate for carryover cooking.
 Your food will continue to cook for a short period of time
 after removing it from the grill
- Rest all meat before slicing and serving it. The juices need time to redistribute themselves throughout the meat
- Don't over-char food to cook through meat with bones
- Stay organized when serving a group. Keep track of what food went onto the grill 1st, 2nd, 3rd etc
- Use a cast iron skillet on your grates to evenly cook food



Gardening in July is hot, hot, hot! As temperatures increase, vegetable gardens pump out the produce and flowers bloom nonstop. This extreme month is also peak time for pests and diseases to appear in your garden.

Fill your outdoor spaces with beautiful blooms to greet visitors to your home when you entertain. Look for Drop-N-Bloom containers at your local The Home Depot Garden Center that will take the guesswork and planting out of creating containers. Red, white and blue combinations featuring colorful geraniums, petunias, lobelia, calibrachoas and pentas will add patriotic panache to your front porch.

Keep up with the harvest by checking your vegetable garden every day. Even if you're not harvesting every day, it's a good idea to scout for insects and diseases by checking underneath leaves and examining new fruit for signs of nibbling or infestation. Frequently pick high producing vegetables like zucchini, squash and cucumbers. When they get too big, they lose flavor.


Like vegetable gardens, lawns need about an inch of water each week. An irrigation system makes it easy to deliver water to your thirsty lawn. Start seeds indoors this month for your fall garden crops like greens and root vegetables. There's still time for a second crop of summertime favorites like green beans and squash. If you start with seedlings, you'll have more time to harvest before frost.

Pick, Pickle, Preserve:

The hottest summer days bring more tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers to enjoy. This is also the time to get the most out of annual herbs like basil. Pinch back flowers to extend the harvest and savor the leaves in herb butters and pesto.

Sun-ripened tomatoes and peppers are delicious in summer salads. Try canning a small batch of salsa with extra produce from your garden. A bumper crop of cukes means plenty of pickles. Look for quick pickling recipes to save time.

Cut Summer Flowers for Bouquets:

When it's too hot to go out in the garden in the middle of the day, head out early and snip zinnias, sunflowers, daisies and dahlias for abundant cut flower bouquets.

Rejuvenate them with some timely deadheading, and if it's been awhile since you've fertilized, give them a dose of all-purpose plant food.

Aerate and Reseed Lawn:

Prepare for the fall season by aerating and reseeding your lawn. Give coolseason grasses time to grow before first frost.



Refresh Your Home With Fall Annuals:

Give your garden some fall love and instant color by planting annuals, such as pansies, mums, celosia, coleus, ornamental peppers and more

Most perennials need dividing at some point, usually every two to three years. Otherwise, your blooms will be competing for nutrients and water. Find out which perennials need dividing now

Plant Perennial Ornamental Grasses:



Anacortes, the crown jewel of Fidalgo Island, is conveniently situated halfway between Seattle & Vancouver BC, and is the destination point for the San Juan Islands and International Ferry runs. The island is known for its historic waterfront, 50-miles of hiking trails, and a mix of annual festivals.

Its year-round music scene is lively and visitors can soak up a range of tunes from rock to bluegrass to jazz at outside venues during the summer and restaurants and bars throughout the year. The culinary scene is ever-growing and you'll find a variety of restaurants with farm-to-table menus, scratch and house-made ingredients, and their specialties like BBQ, fusion, and rustic scratch.

ANACORTES FOREST LANDS

The Anacortes Community Forest Lands (ACFL) is approximately 2,800 acres of forestland owned by the City of Anacortes in several large tracts. Within city limits, find forested hills, lakes, streams, wetlands, and meadows. Twenty miles of trails provide public access to the forest lands.

There are nine loop trails for horses, motorcycles, bikers, and hikers. Some areas are limited to specific user groups. The changing terrain and trailside viewpoints provide panoramic views of the surrounding area. Trail maps are available at several local businesses.

DECEPTION PASS STATE PARK

This park is a 4,134-acre marine and camping park on three different lakes with 77,000 feet of saltwater shoreline and 33,900 feet of freshwater shoreline surrounded by breathtaking views, old-growth forests, and abundant wildlife.

CAUSLAND PARK

Causland Park was built in the 1920s by John Baptiste LePage to honor Anacortes veterans from World War I to the Vietnam War. It has extensive ornate rock work and is on the National Register of Historic Places. The park, surrounded by low serpentine mosaic walls, has a bandstand, amphitheater, and terraces made of colored pebble and rock mosaic. Other park features include picnic tables, mature ornamental plantings, and a small grassy lawn.

CRANBERRY LAKE AREA

This heavily forested site near the city center contains Cranberry Lake (approximately 27 acres) and several other small lakes and bogs. The terrain varies from flat to steep slopes. This area has an extensive trail system.

ALICE PARCHMAN NEWLAND PARK

A 10-acre linear park and street median developed along the R Avenue access road from Highway 20 into Anacortes waterfront industries and recreation areas. The south end contains the Smith sculpture, and the north end of the median widens to accommodate the Ben Root Skate Park. The 7,500 square foot concrete skate park has parking, a drinking fountain, lights, seating, and a restroom nearby.

SEAFARERS MEMORIAL PARK

The Seaman Memorial is located at the Cap Sante Marina. Parking, picnic tables, a promenade, and beach access with a stunning view of Fidalgo Bay are all available.

VOLUNTEER PARK — KIWANIS MEADOWS PARK – DANIELS FIELD

This sports field complex includes three baseball fields and a soccer field. The Kiwanis Meadows area is a full-size soccer field/open space with trees that provide a meadow-like atmosphere. The Alton R. Daniels and Volunteer fields are regulation baseball fields, while the Marguerite and Don Daniels field is artificial grass. The newest addition to the park is the Doug Colglazier Playground featuring play equipment, a covered picnic shelter, and a full-size basketball court. When completed, the Rice Complex will include a football and soccer stadium, a 400-meter surfaced track, and other related amenities.

MOUNT ERIE PARK

Mt. Erie Park spans 160 acres. At the top of Mt. Erie, elevation 1,270 ft, choose from four viewing areas and be rewarded with spectacular views in all directions. Mt. Erie is Fidalgo Island's highest point and is part of the former Anacortes watershed. There is a small parking area as well as a road that leads to the summit. Trails from this area lead into a portion of the Anacortes Community Forest Lands covering 1400+ acres.

ROTARY PARK

Rotary Park is a 1.5-acre linear park located on the north and east edge of the Cap Sante Boat Haven at the base of Cap Sante. Rotary Park has a paved pedestrian trail out to the Cap Sante breakwater, picnic tables, and a shelter. A nine-hole disc golf course at Rotary Park was made possible with support from the Anacortes Parks Foundation, the City of Anacortes, and the Rotary Club. The course is a challenging short par-3 course with many obstacles.


SHARPE PARK & MONTGOMERY-DUBAN HEADLANDS PARK

A 110-acre park has the most undeveloped waterfront on Fidalgo Island. Highlights include a freshwater beaver pond and stunning views of Rosario Strait. A short 3/4-mile walk through old-growth firs, madronas, and lichen-shrouded trees take you to sweeping views of north Puget Sound. Kids will enjoy walking first along the trail by a large pond filled with widgeons, mallards, cattails, and red-winged blackbirds.

ACE OF HEARTS ROTARY PARK

The fenced dog areas include off-leash dog areas, one for large dogs and one for small dogs, plus water for the pets, pet waste disposal bags, and portable restrooms. The City of Anacortes Parks Department, Anacortes Rotary Club, and the Anacortes Little League worked together to develop a new baseball field. Ace of Hearts Rotary Park also includes wetland improvements, a parking lot, trails, and a creek. Dogs must have current vaccinations and a license.

Experience Anacortes-Historic Skyline Marina




Nestled on the Northwest side of beautiful Anacortes WA, the Skyline Marine Center and surrounding Skyline community has a rich and fascinating history. Currently one of the fastest growing communities in Anacortes and the surrounding areas, Skyline was originally home to WF Industry-Mills.

Opening its doors in Skyline in 1924, WF Industry-Mills was one of the largest wood mills in the Puget Sound. Exemplified by its (at the time) state of the art drying and milling facility, WF Industry-Mills was a staple of the wood milling industry of the Pacific Northwest. Unfortunately, union strikes forced the mill to close in 1952.

Even though it's been over 60 years since the mill was in operation, its footprint still finds a very useful purpose today. The area that once featured the main mill building now provides homes for 5 different condominium buildings. The one-of-a-kind dry and milling building still stands today and sees regular use by the marina for indoor boat storage.

An interisland ferry allows island hoppers to travel between the islands and an international ferry offers service to Sidney, B.C. March - December.

All San Juan Islands ferries depart from the Anacortes Ferry Terminal located at 2100 Ferry Terminal Rd, Anacortes, WA 98221. Allow a comfortable 2 - 3 hours to enjoy the drive and the scenery from Seattle or Vancouver B.C. Make sure this includes enough time to arrive 30-minutes before departure for your reservation check-in.
